#### Commissioner Jordan brings Thanksgiving to hundreds of District One residents

In addition, volunteers from Farm Share were on hand to distribute nutritious produce to residents.

Later that day, Commissioner Jordan personally delivered turkeys to seniors in her district, going door-to-door to homes chosen by several local organizations: the Center for Family and Child Enrichment, God's Original Daughters, and Antioch Missionary Baptist Church.

"The great part of Thanksgiving is getting the whole family around the table to reminisce about fond memories and being grateful to have one another," said Commissioner Jordan. "I'm happy to be able to contribute to those families who may have not been able to afford a nice meal this year."

More than 300 people came out to Acadia Park for the free event, which featured various activities and presentations highlighting the positive influences of District One's growing Hispanic community in Miami-Dade County.

Attendees danced to festive live music, and even had the opportunity to dance with the commissioner to win Sedano's gift certificates. Other activities embracing Hispanic culture were folkloric presentations; dance performances by The Roxy Theater Group, Community Book and Dance Academy, and Pedro Vilanova & Acento Antillano; and an art display. Children had a blast at the Kid Zone with games, a clown, and treats like snow cones and popcorn. Raffles for great prizes were also held. In addition, families were able to take advantage of services provided by the

Jackson Health Mobile Unit, and child fingerprinting for safety IDs. More information was available regarding immigration, legal aide, income tax, home buyer, and rehabilitation programs.

Throughout the event, Rosina Grosso of Sabado Gigante acted as Mistress of Ceremonies, ensuring that all guests had a wonderful time.

#### Stay safe this holiday season

'Tis the season for family and friends with the upcoming holidays. Though the holidays are typically a fun and relaxing time, residents should still be wary of certain safety hazards that pop up this time of year. Here are some tips from Miami-Dade's Fire Rescue and Police Departments that will help you have a happy and safe holiday season!

- When sprucing up your home, carefully inspect each electrical decoration new or old before plugging it in. Cracked sockets, frayed, bare, or loose wires can cause serious electric shock or start a fire.
- When the holidays are over, take down your lights. Light strings are not meant to be up more than 90 days.
- At home, do not display all your gifts where they can be seen from a window or doorway.
- If you plan to be out of town for the holidays, have a friend or family member check on your home and leave emergency contact information with them.
- Avoid carrying a lot of packages; it can make you look defenseless. Place all packages and gifts in the locked trunk of your vehicle.
- Remember that the number one cause of house fires throughout the year is cooking that is left unattended. During the holidays, we add the dangerous combination of more cooking, more distractions, and more stress. Keep a close eye on your cooking, and use a timer to ensure you don't get distracted.
- Regularly check your tree for fresh, green needles. Trees that have dried out over several weeks are easier to ignite. Remember to keep your tree watered at all times.

## Commissioner Jordan hosts United Negro College Fund, Florida Memorial University fundraising kick-off

Touring the "Black Freedom in Florida" exhibit at the Historical Museum of Southern Florida in Downtown Miami, Commissioner Jordan understood just

how far African-Americans have come in their civil rights struggle. On September 10, 2009, Commissioner Jordan urged the Miami-Dade community to continue the push for higher education among minority students. The commissioner, as well as Miami-Dade County Mayor Carlos Alvarez, hosted a fundraising kick-off for the United Negro College Fund (UNCF) to support students at Florida Memorial University.

Commissioner Jordan spoke to supporters at the event, she referred to President Barack Obama's September address to the nation's students, where he remarked that what a student makes of his or her education "will decide nothing less than the future of this country."

"President Obama's astute words exemplify the principles of our United Negro College Fund, which makes education a priority every day for the thousands of students it sends to college annually," said

Commissioner Jordan. "[UNCF is] the reason that many of our minority students, many of whom are the first to attend college in their families, are able to finish school with the skills needed to compete in the job market and make our communities better places to live."

Florida Memorial University, which resides in Commissioner Jordan's district, is the only historically black university in southern Florida. The school is one of 39 UNCFmember institutions, and college tuitions for many students are kept lower via donations made to UNCF. About 84 percent of the students at UNCF-member colleges come from low to moderate-income families. Commissioner Jordan is an alumna of Morris Brown College in Atlanta, another historically black college.

# County's first skate park opens in District One

Residents in District One have a whole new way to have fun. On July 16, 2009, Commissioner Jordan, along with Miami-Dade Parks' Director Jack Kardys, and children from the community, participated in a skateboard park ribbon-cutting ceremony at Country Village Park, located at 6550 NW 188 Terrace, in Miami. This was the first skate park completed by Miami-Dade County. Commissioner Jordan was instrumental in securing approximately \$185,000 in funding to cover the cost of the park's lighting, now in its design stage.



"Recreational sites like this skate park are vital in keeping our community's children active and off the streets," said Commissioner Jordan. "I look forward to when the entire project is finished and plan to promote family-friendly activities at Country Village Park."

The lighting portion is expected to complete by December 2009.

#### Legislative Matters Important to You

Commissioner Barbara Jordan is committed to serving the residents of District One by sponsoring legislation that is in their best interest. Here are some of the items sponsored by Commissioner Jordan that are being considered or have been adopted by the Board of County Commissioners:

ADOPTED: Resolution directing the County Mayor to conduct a study analyzing the feasibility of creating a SWAT medic position, and directing the Mayor to present to the Board a report regarding the findings of the study and a plan for implementation of a pilot program, including certification standards. (R-1291-09)

ADOPTED: Resolution urging the Florida Legislature to co-designate SR 860/NW 183rd Street from NW 27th Avenue to NW 57th Avenue as "Bishop Isaiah S. Williams Jr. Boulevard." (R-1121-09)

ADOPTED: Resolution requesting the County Mayor or Mayor's designee to investigate and, if appropriate, prepare an analysis of the feasibility and cost of upgrading the street lighting systems serving the Scott Lake Manor Street Lighting Improvement District. (R-968-09)

**ADOPTED**: Ordinance creating the Miami-Dade Housing Civil Rights Oversight Board, setting forth purpose, composition of the Board, specifying powers, duties, and responsibilities, providing severability, and inclusion in the Code.
